January Days to Observe: International Day of Education Jan. 24, World Braille Day Jan 4

The United Nations General Assembly has proclaimed Jan. 24 as International Day of Education, in celebration of the role for education for peace and development. The theme for 2026 is "The Power of Youth in Co-Creating Education." It recognizes that people younger than 30 constitute more than half of the global population. They are a driving force for sustainable development, innovation, and social transformation. UNESCO says this about the theme: "When it comes to shaping the future of education, youth have a special role to play. They are the beneficiaries of education programs, and their future depends on it."

"For this reason, meaningfully engaging students, and youth in co-creating the education they want is essential to meet their aspirations and ambitions. This is particularly true at a time of radical transformation induced by the technological revolution, which calls for rethinking the purpose and modalities of teaching and learning."

Education transforms lives and breaks the cycle of poverty that traps so many children. An educated mother will make sure her children go and stay in school. This is fundamental, especially when more than 250 million children and youth are out of school globally and most of those in school are not acquiring the basic skills.

Additionally, 44 million teachers are needed to achieve universal primary and secondary education by 2030. These challenges are further compounded by 70 percent of countries who allocate less than 4 percent of their GDP to education.



World Braille Day

World Braille Day, celebrated on Jan. 4 each year, honors the legacy and contributions of Louis Braille, the inventor of Braille system of reading for those who are blind or sight impaired.

This day also raises awareness about the importance of Braille as a tactile reading and writing system. World Braille Day also serves as a reminder of the significance of accessibility and inclusion in education information dissemination.

Louis Braille was born on Jan. 4, 1809. It is a day to celebrate his life and the impact of the Braille system on the lives of people who are blind.

The United Nations General Assembly officially established World Braille Day on Dec. 17, 2018.

The theme for World Braille Day is "Accessibility and Inclusion for the Visually Impaired." This theme urges society and governments worldwide to adopt inclusive design and practices and Braille on all important documents such as ATM cards, public transportation cards, and bank enquiry books.

Who Will Lead Altrusa of HSV in 2026-27? Please Consider Serving as a Club Officer

As the new calendar year descends upon us, we need to remember that our membership year is only half over. We still have many things to accomplish before June 1.

Among them are writing a grant request to the Altrusa International Foundation for one of our service projects, preparing submissions for District and International Awards, preparing year-end reports, and preparing a new slate of officers for the upcoming year and voting on those officers, and electing delegates to the District Eight Conference.

We have many new Altrusa members who may not know the process for electing new officers, and I think a review would be good for everyone.

In January, the membership will elect a Nominating Committee of at least three Club members who will be tasked with finding members to replace offices that will be vacated. The Club President cannot serve on this committee. The Nominating Committee will meet and put together a list of prospective candidates and contact them to see if they are willing to serve on the leadership team. The Nominating Committee notifies Club members at the February meeting of the slate of candidates who have made a commitment to serve if elected. Nominations also can be made from the floor.

The election will be held in March, and installation of officers is in May.

I ask that you all think seriously about serving in an office. Our club functions at a very high level because our members are willing to go the extra mile and help lead us down the path of dedicated service.

become a Lamplighter donor is impossible for you, perhaps it's not. The Lamplighter program, started in 1987, recognizes Altrusans who donate \$500 annually to Altrusa Foundation programs. Lamplighters receive a gold pin on their first donation, and a diamond for that pin upon each annual donation. Like me, many Club members might assume it's a one-time \$500 donation annually, and some of us are unlikely to find that amount in our monthly budget. However, the December issue of the Foundation Impact newsletter highlighted another option – an "installment" plan that makes it more affordable. If you contribute \$45 a month starting in January, you're at \$540 by the end of 2026 and you become a Lamplighter. Funds raised by the Foundation support multiple causes – disaster relief, scholarships, and grants to clubs for community service projects, among others. Altrusa of HSV has benefited from those grants.

The Spring Fling committee, headed by President Laurie Herman, has been hard at work handling the details with the venue, entertainers, and caterer, securing decorations, designing, and printing flyers and tickets, printing volunteer signup sheets and drinking prosecco,

Wait a minute – drinking prosecco? It's for a good cause – the bottles are faceted and pretty and we'll be using them with lights in table centerpieces. Feel free to enjoy a bottle of Freixenet or Baglietti prosecco and donate it empty.

Here are the details for the event:

Spring Fling Italiano will be 5-8:30 p.m. at the Coronado Community Center, with dinner at 6 and entertainment featuring Ken Goodman and the TEF Combo starting around 6:30 p.m. Ken will sing and interact with the audience and the Combo will play songs that may make dancers take to the floor.

Tickets will be \$50 per person for a wonderful Italian meal catered by Home Plate Café & Bakery. On the menu are Lasagna Bolognese with four cheeses and two meats; salad with spring micro greens (ranch or raspberry vinaigrette dressing); Romano (flat) Italian-style green beans sauteed with sun-dried tomatoes, garlic, and olive oil; rosemary and garlic Italian rolls, and four-layer Italian Cream Cake. The gluten free/vegetarian option is Four-Cheese Lasagna made with vegetable marinara, using gluten-free noodles; the micro greens salad; the Romano green beans; optional Italian rolls; and strawberry amaretto cake made with almond flour. Coffee, water, and tea will be available.
